Montgomery Co. Adoption into BGHCC	 Healthcare referral patterns have patients within Montgomery Co. often coming into our region due to being a part of the St. Joseph system. They are also part of the NDMS system. For these reasons, the Executive Committee approved a plan to absorb those health and medical partners into our coalition and out of the East Healthcare Coalition. However, the LHDs will remain a part of the East region's Brandon Stacy, RPC, oversight. Motion approved by those in attendance. 	
Coalition App Development Continues	JT demo'd the BGHCC app as it stands currently. More changes may come, but much of the functions we wanted to use and have access to are available. The Executive Committee will pilot the app first as we slowly roll this out and then we will begin the process of onboarding other members. Enrollment will be optional and will require email or phone association with an app member account.	
HPP Notice of Funding (NOFO) – Next 5 Year Cycle	 Finally received our NOFO for HPP funding. Some of the focus and emphasis outlined in the agreement for the upcoming 5-year cycle include things like Cybersecurity, Extended Downtime Support (not just COOP, but any kind of downtime event like water outage, power outage, etc.), and Recovery Planning within our region. They also changed some wording regarding core partnerships and no longer specify "hospitals" but rather use "healthcare partners". This includes all of the agencies we currently consider our core partners, but it also includes the other ancillary agencies that are also part of our coalition like dialysis, behavioral health, clinical services, and others.

RPC Updates	 Wrapping up end-of-FY deliverables regarding. Vicki and Rebecca will be reviewing what has been uploaded to make sure it's been reported up to the State to satisfy the federal funding grant. In July, LHDs will be meeting to discuss the new deliverables and begin outlining their 5-year plans. 	
MRC Updates	 Over 130 volunteers now, though the fully credentialed total is about 30. Working to increase both the total volunteers and assist them with the process of becoming fully credentialed. Had an inaugural volunteer summit which went very well and was well-received by volunteer attendees. Already beginning to plan for next year's summit. Working with local EMs and civic groups to incorporate MRC volunteers into emergency and disaster processes, like volunteer, donations, and personal property management. Partnering again with HOSA students to improve volunteer recruitment which is being incentivized with prizes like emergency supply backpacks. 	
NDMS Updates	 Have completed TTXs in advance of the NDMS full-scale exercise at BG Airport. Also had a site visit with participants out at the airport to familiarize everyone to where things will be located and how to exercise will progress day-of. Expecting to surge ~35 patients and will simulate patient reception, treatment, and disposition to hospitals. Reminder given about the bed reporting exercise on July 11th. 	
Epi Updates	 Bluegrass – Continuing to monitor COVID cases within the region, but pertussis has become a greater concern more recently, especially in younger individuals. Lexington-Fayette – Still monitoring flu, but with virtually no cases happening now, flu season is thankfully over; Seeing an uptick in Legionella cases, though these cases have been unrelated at this time. We often see an increase in cases around this time of year due to warming temperatures and water-related activities, both recreational and at home (air conditioners and hoses/misters/sprinklers). Also have a possible hospital-acquired case from a UK patient; Lyme disease increase – be careful while being active outside and look for ticks; had a rabid skunk in the region that did bite an animal control officer. This individual did have prophylactic vaccination due to their line of work, but recommendations are to still receive treatment following an exposure; monitoring a pertussis outbreak mostly involving 36 middle-to-high school aged children who have actually already been vaccinated, which is concerning and also delays confirmation of a

	pertussis diagnosis because it's assumed they wouldn't have it due to being vaccinated.	
	One particularly complicated case involved a family member of a confirmed individual with	
	pertussis who had taken a trip to France and required treatment before she would be	
	allowed to re-enter the US upon return.	
	 Capital – 6 cases of pertussis currently, all of which are fully vaccinated high school 	
	students. It's clear this outbreak is widespread within our overall Bluegrass region; COVID	
	reporting requirements will be ending on June 30 th . Data can still be requested, but there	
	will no longer be investigations occurring unless they are pregnant or pediatric, or within	
	LTCs; Also have a few cases of Salmonella which highlights the importance of being careful



STATE EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTER ACTIVATION LEVELS

The SEOC is activated based on the level of operational schemes as listed below. SEOC activation does not need to be sequential. Further details on SEOC activations are outlined in the SEOC Activation Guide.





LEVEL 5 NORMAL OPERATIONS

Level 5 is the normal, day-to-day State Warning Point (SWP) duty status.

LEVEL 4- MODIFIED -VIRTUAL MONITORING

This is for an incident or event and will require a higher management level than just the Duty Officer (DO) and Manager on Call (MOC) but does not require onsite SEOC personnel. KYEM, Emergency Support Functions (ESF), and the Kentucky National Guard (KYNG) monitor the situation virtually through WebEOC.

LEVEL 3 - PARTIAL ACTIVATION

This level requires immediate activation of the SEOC structure to manage multiple resources over an extended period to meet the significant needs of local first responders and emergency management agencies. This requires the activation of select ESF representatives.

LEVEL 2 - FULL ACTIVATION WITH ALL STATE PARTNERS

This level of incident or event requires all actions taken under a Level 3 plus activation of all the SEOC structure, including all ESF partners.

Resources are drawn from multiple regional assets across the Commonwealth and could include introducing a federal resource. The incident is of an extended duration.

LEVEL 1 - FULL ACTIVATION WITH FEDERAL PARTNERS

Level 1 activations are considered catastrophic incidents. These incidents are expected to have a high impact on the Commonwealth and are expected to require the full activation of all local, county, and state assets and the full integration of the SEOC with all required federal resources. This incident could span multiple days, weeks, or months.





KENTUCKY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT EMERGENCY SUPPORT FUNCTIONS (ESFS)



Coordinates the movement of people, goods, and services during an emergency. This includes providing support for evacuations and ensuring the availability of transportation resources.



2 COMMUNICATIONS

Ensures that effective and efficient communications systems are in place to support response and recovery efforts. This includes providing interoperable communication capabilities across various agencies and jurisdictions.



PUBLIC WORKS & ENGINEERING

Provides support for infrastructure restoration and repair. This includes activities such as debris removal, restoration of utilities, and ensuring safe and functional public facilities.

FIREFIGHTING

Coordinates and provides resources and personnel for fire suppression efforts. This includes both wildland and structural firefighting.



5 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT /INFORMATION & PLANNING

Coordinates the overall federal response efforts and provides support in areas such as situation assessment, resource management, and coordination with other agencies and organizations.



MASS CARE, EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE, TEMP. HOUSING, & HUMAN SERVICES

Addresses the needs of affected individuals and communities by providing shelter, food, medical care, & other essential services. This ESF also supports long-term recovery efforts.

LOGISTICS

Manages the procurement, transportation, distribution, and tracking of resources and supplies needed for response and recovery operations.



8 PUBLIC HEALTH & MEDICAL SERVICES

Provides support for public health and medical services, including medical care, disease prevention, and coordination with healthcare facilities and organizations.



SEARCH & RESCUE

Coordinates search & and rescue efforts to locate and assist individuals in distress, including urban search and rescue, technical rescue, and waterborne search and rescue.

OIL & HAZARDOUS <u>MATE</u>RIALS RESPONSE

Addresses incidents involving oil and hazardous materials, including cleanup and containment efforts to protect public health and the environment.



11 AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES

Supports response and recovery efforts related to agriculture, food safety, and natural resources. This includes activities like food distribution and ensuring the safety of agricultural products.



2 ENERGY

Coordinates efforts to ensure the continuity of energy supplies and services during and after an emergency. This includes electricity, natural gas, and other forms of energy.

PUBLIC SAFETY & SECURITY

Enhances public safety and security through law enforcement and other activities. This ESF supports efforts to maintain order, protect critical infrastructure, and ensure public safety.



14 CROSS-SECTOR BUSINE

Supports the coordination of cross-sector operations, including stabilization of key supply chains and community lifelines, among infrastructure owners and operators, businesses, and their government partners.



15 PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Manages communication and coordination with external partners, stakeholders, and the public, including media relations and community outreach.

RECOVERY

The recovery team will use preestablished strategies and early identification of disaster severity to implement recovery plans. They will use this data to recommend declarations to the leadership.

MILITARY SUPPORT

The military provides personnel, resources, and logistical support in emergencies to enhance the capabilities of other ESF partners, including Logistics, Supply Search & Rescue, Evacuations, and Security.







ESFs (Emergency Support Functions) coordinate response efforts for emergencies or disasters that exceed the capacity of local resources.





Volunteer Coordination



Kentucky is one of only a few states, nationwide, which employs a full-time Volunteer Coordinator. It is the responsibility of the Program Coordinator to ensure that unmet disaster needs are identified and met.

Unlike other disaster programs managed by KYEM, the Volunteer Coordination Program can be activated for events which do not receive a presidential declaration.

Major activities of this program include:

- · Disaster Assistance
- Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters (VOADs)
- · Long Term Recovery Committees
- · Donation Management

Disaster Assistance Often times, citizens have recovery needs that are not covered by local, state, or federal programs. The KYEM Volunteer Coordinator can assist by locating volunteers and organizations that can provide assistance such as debris clearance, sandbagging, home muck outs, minor home repairs, etc. It is imperative that citizens report unmet needs. Citizens should call the county emergency director's office or help line (if their community has a designated help line). County directors or local VOADS are responsible for contacting the KYEM Volunteer Coordinator with requests for volunteer assistance.
